Americus Uses Sales Tax Funds to Improve Ballfields

The residents of Americus, population 910, worked hard in 2018 to pass a half-cent sales tax dedicated to creating "recreation purposes for the betterment of the youth." From 2019 through 2021, the sales tax funds were used to move forward with community's efforts to build a new ballfield complex. The community has raised over \$450,000 through private fundraising, donations, and grants for the project. The sole city baseball field will soon see the addition of a new t-ball field, full-size baseball/softball field, renovated concessions and bathrooms, a new playground, fencing, and parking. The Americus Ballfield Complex is now under construction and will be gifted to the City of Americus in May 2022.

The ballfields are just one example of the community's efforts to improve recreational opportunities in Americus. Project Playscape, a local non-profit, has worked to also start a fundraising effort, overlapping the ballfield project, to raise \$200,000 to build a splash pad. The splash pad will also be a future gift to the City of Americus. The new project will provide a splash pad, benches, canopy for shade and renovated bathrooms with new changing areas added. With any additional funds remaining, Project Playscape will also work to build a new outdoor basketball pad at the Americus City-Jones Park.



Project Playscape works to raise funds for larger projects that rural communities are unable to pay for, or would take decades of saving to achieve. Project Playscape was founded in 2010 with a mission of raising funds to improve and enhance facilities and programs centered on physical activity, recreation, and team building within the City of Americus and Lyon County, Kansas. All children and families benefit from Project Playscape in that it provides opportunities for play and recreation, which is especially critical for the physical and emotional development of children.
