FROM CITY HALL

The following minutes are from the April 14th, 2026 business meeting. As of print time, the minutes have not been approved by council. CALL TO ORDER / ROLL CALL: The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Mayor WRIGHT. Council members present were NUESSEN, HARMON, HINRICHS, BURTON, and GERLEMAN. Also present, City Attorney Steve Atherton and City Clerk Dodie Doudna.

VISITORS/PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD: Amie Jones and Andrew Onermaa

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: Moved by HARMON to approve March 10, 2026, Business Meeting minutes. Motion seconded by NUESSEN 5-0 Vote

BILLS TO PAY: Moved by HINRICHS to approve the April bills to pay in the amount of \$57012.33. Motion seconded by BURTON. 5-0 Vote

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

PROJECT PLAYScape- Easter Egg hunt was a success. Increased some age groups, and still feel like we need to increase more for next year. Submitted Match Day application and other grants. Raised \$2,000 at the spaghetti dinner for the Flint Hills Gravel Ride.

MAINTENANCE: Had a sewer issue that required AI Pump Jet to come out. A resident had a back up and it was determined that the issue was in the city line. Moved by HINRICHS to pay Conley Excavating in the amount of \$2252.08. Motion seconded by BURTON. 5-0 Vote. Working on getting the chip spreader up and running ready to go for summer. Dump truck still being repaired at Hoyts

CLERK: Vet Clinic will be held on June 6th. City wide garage sales will be June 20th. Maintenance went to hang banners for the Farmers Market and one is not usable and the other is in rough shape. Clerk has requested a quote to replace. Council directed to look at metal signs instead of the banners to hold up longer. Steve's Trash has asked if they can stage dumpsters at the soccer field after pick up on Friday, April 24th. Council agreed. Clerk asked for approval to call Flint Hills Pest Control to see about removing the wasps in city hall ceiling.

ADOPT THE AGENDA. Moved by HINRICHS to approve the agenda. Motion seconded by BURTON. 5-0 Vote

1.UNBOUND GRAVEL: Andrew Onermaa asked for approval of road closure for Unbound Gravel, use of the Community Center if available, and utilizing the park as in the past. Moved by BURTON to close Locust St from 5th to Main from 7am on May 30th to 7 am May 31st, approve use of community center and park. Motion seconded by HINRICHS. 5-0 Vote.

2. ADA COMPLIANCE COMMUNITY CENTER: Amie Jones presented that the county would like to move the polling place to the community center. In order to do so some ADA compliance issues would need fixed. Council agreed to fix the items to become compliant. Clerk will follow up with Jones once they are completed.

3. POLICE DEPARTMENT: NUESSEN reported that Jody Meyers had completed the inventory and is working through evidence and cases. Will update next meeting. Council discussed code enforcement position, consensus that the position would be no more than 10 hours per week with a pay range of \$18-22.

4.BUILDING PERMIT FEE INCREASE: It was presented that building permit fees had not been reviewed since 2009. Moved by Nuessen to approve Ordinance 633, increasing the building permit fees effective on publication date. Motion seconded by HARMON. 4-1 Vote.

5. BALLFIELD RESPONSIBILITIES: BURTON wanted to ensure that responsibilities were known between city staff and ARO. ARO is responsible for all cleaning of buildings and bathrooms, taking out trash and keeping facilities and bathrooms locked. ARO is also responsible for all field maintenance and marking of fields on game days. Council asked the clerk to invite ARO to next meeting to ensure everything is communicated.

6. VIDEO/CAMERAS IN CITY HALL: BURTON discussed the need for video cameras at city hall for the safety of staff. Council all agreed that it is a smart step to take in light of some recent events. Clerk was instructed to ask IT for a quote and some options.

7.COMMUNITY SURVEY: HINRICHS shared the community survey that was developed. Consensus to share on Facebook, website and in the newsletter.

8.HAZARD MITIGATION FUND RESOLUTION #311: Moved by BURTON to approve Resolution 311. Motion seconded by HINRICHS. 5-0 Vote

9.MOWING RELEASE APPROVAL: Council reviewed mowing exemptions. Moved by BURTON to approve mowing exemption applications for 2026. Motion seconded by NUESSEN. 5-0 Vote

10.CONDEMNATION LIST: No updates

11. EXECUTIVE SESSION: Non-elected personnel matters: Moved by NUESSEN to go into executive session for 10 minutes starting at 8:23 pm with council, attorney and clerk present. Out of executive session at 8:30. WRIGHT advised clerk to offer Justin Arb the position of Code Enforcement Officer.

Motion to adjourn at 8:31 pm by BURTON. Seconded by HINRICHS. 5-0 Vote

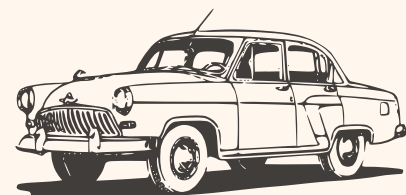

TNR EFFORTS IN AMERICUS

How Do We Address the Growth of Community Cats in Our City?

As noted in previous City Council meetings, our community continues to experience a growing population of stray and community cats. In an effort to proactively address this issue, the City of Americus has partnered with Street Cats Club and Forever Home Pet Rescue to implement a Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) effort for the local stray cat population. TNR is widely recognized as the only effective and humane approach to managing and stabilizing community cat populations. With continued complaints and reports from residents throughout town, we are expanding our efforts to identify hotspots and prioritize areas in need of TNR services.



We need your help!

If you have seen or continue to see outside, stray, or unowned cats near your home, please help by reporting them to our local TNR effort. These reports help the city and our partners identify hotspots and prioritize areas where Trap-Neuter-Return services are most needed. **To report go to:** QR link (shown here)

To help ensure the success of trapping, residents contacted about trap locations are asked not to feed the cats for 24 hours prior. This helps make the cats more food-motivated to enter the traps.

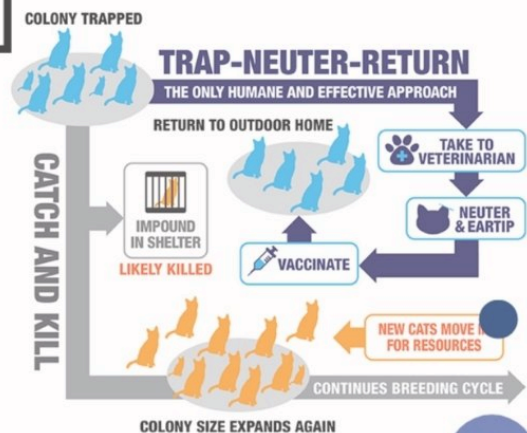

THE VACUUM EFFECT

Quick tips for keeping cats from your yard:

1. Talk to your neighbors:

- Determine if the cats are pets, strays, or feral.
- If the cats are not pets, those that have been TNR'd will typically have a clipped ear. If there is no sign of a clipped ear, or you are unsure, report the cat(s) to Street Cats Club.

2. Secure trash sources:

- Use trash cans with tight-fitting lids or secure them with a bungee cord.

3. Protect soil and garden beds from digging:

- Cover exposed soil with large river rocks to prevent digging and also deter weeds.
- Research safe deterrents.

4. Use deterrents:

- Install ultrasonic devices or motion-activated sprinklers (available at garden supply stores).
- Apply nontoxic deterrents such as fresh orange or lemon peels, or metal pans filled with vinegar around areas you want to protect.

5. Block entry points:

- Close gaps in the foundations of sheds, porches, or other structures to prevent cats from seeking shelter.

Common Questions & Answers:

If I report TNR cats or colonies, will I be billed for services rendered?

No. Reporting stray or unowned cats simply adds the location to Street Cats Club and the City's tracking list. At this time, City Council has approved funding for TNR services for up to 30 cats. When City resources or funding are limited or expended, Street Cats Club, a nonprofit organization, may be able to provide TNR services on a priority basis through donations and grant funding.

If I own a cat or cats and need help getting them spayed or neutered, are there resources available?

Yes. Low-cost spay and neuter resources may be available through local nonprofit organizations and animal welfare partners, including Street Cats Club. Availability may vary based on funding, grants, and program capacity. Residents are encouraged to reach out directly to these organizations to learn about current options and eligibility.

- No permit needed for anything under 120 sq ft.
- No permit needed for a fence 6 ft or under.
- No setbacks for fences but has to be on or within your property. Either have a survey or agree with your neighbor. (Survey is best)
- No inspection on patios

0 – 1,000.00	\$50.00
1,001.00 – 25,000.00	\$100.00
25,001.00 – 50,000.00	\$150.00
50,001.00 – 75,000.00	\$200.00
75,001.00 – 100,000.00	\$250.00
100,000.00 and up	\$350.00

May in Americus: A Little Dirt, A Little Grit, and a Whole Lot of Heart

If January was about saying “yes” and April was about not giving up on yourself—then May? May is when Americus stretches its arms, steps outside, and says, “Alright... let’s get to it.”

Because this time of year? We’re alive again.

Fields are moving. Ranchers are already halfway through their day before most of us have had coffee. Kids are bouncing between ball games, the pool, and whatever patch of grass they can turn into an adventure. Evenings fill up with backyard barbecues where neighbors gather, stories get told, and laughter carries just a little farther in the warm air.

It’s busy. It’s a little chaotic. It’s full.

It suits us.

Americus has never been the kind of town to sit still.

From the very beginning, it’s had to prove it could endure. A drought in 1860 that should have ended things before they really began. Tornadoes in 1881 that took down churches but not the people inside them—they kept the faith. The Great Blizzard of 1886 that tested just how strong a person could be, and then asked a little more.

Lets not forget about that county seat vote in 1860—when we were the obvious choice (more central, better positioned... we could go on), and yet somehow Emporia ended up with the title.

Now look... we’re not ones to gossip.

But if you hear someone say the word “corruption” with a little side-eye and a smile? Well... we’ll just let history do its thing.

Funny thing is—it didn’t stop us.

Nothing ever really does.

While other small towns faded when the railroad moved on, Americus stayed. Quietly. Steadily. Working in the background. Building, growing, adapting. From wind-powered mills on the prairie to cheese factories that turned hard work into something lasting—this town never gave up on itself.

If you live here—you’re part of that same story.

Because life here asks something of you.

We’re not Emporia. You don’t just run down the street for what you forgot. That “quick trip” takes a little planning. Those late-night moments feel a little farther from help. It’s not always convenient.

But it builds something in you.

The same thing that’s been here all along.

Grit. Faith. A steady kind of strength that doesn’t need to show off to be real.

May is when you see it best.

In the long days. The dusty shoes. The sound of kids laughing down the block. The quiet pride in a job done right—whether it’s in the field, at home, or somewhere in between.

It’s not flashy.

It’s better than that.

It’s real.

So if life feels a little full right now—good. That means you’re in it. Living it. Growing, even in the middle of the everyday routines. around here, resilience isn’t something we talk about.

It’s something we live.

Americus never gave up. Through every storm, every setback, every moment that could have been the end—the heart of this town just kept beating. Steady. Strong. Unshaken.

And it still does today—because of people like you.

Small Town USA. Big heart. And just enough grit to keep going, no matter what comes our way.
